The 7th International Symposium on Palaeohistology (ISPH) will take place 16–20 June 2025 at the University of Queensland (UQ, venue TBC) on the beautiful <u>St Lucia campus</u> in Brisbane, Queensland, Australia. It will be Aussie winter in June, but you can expect nice and balmy weather in the 20°C's. Winter is the perfect time to visit Queensland, which otherwise gets very hot and humid in the Summer. Palaeohistology research at UQ is conducted from the School of the Environment (palaeontology) and the School of Social Science (hominin research through archaeology and palaeoanthropology). Brisbane is home to a vertebrate palaeontology lab at Griffith University, where some palaeohistology research is also conducted.

Call for session proposals

The ISPH 2025 organising committee invites session proposals that focus on specific themes and/or issues in palaeohistology.

- A proposed session must have at least one organiser who be responsible for confirming all session speakers and will chair the session.
- All sessions are limited to four speakers (minimum of three).
- Session organisers provide a session title and abstract of up to 200 words alongside a list of
 proposed speakers and individual podium talk titles. The session abstract should state the
 problem the session is addressing and the aim(s) of the session. The individual speakers are
 next invited to submit their abstracts for session podium talks through the general abstract
 submission platform online should the session proposal be accepted.
- Submissions are limited to two abstracts per lead author for the entire symposium. This means
 that one lead author can submit to present once in an organised session and once part of
 general sessions. There is no limit to the number of times the same author can be a co-author
 on other abstracts.
- Session talks are limited to 12 minutes in duration, leaving 12 minutes at the end of the session for panel-type Q&A (60 minutes in total per session assuming four speakers).

Session proposal submission will be online via the <u>Sessions & abstracts</u> tab on our website. The submission platform opens at 9am AEST (GMT+10) on **1 March 2024**. All session organisers will have their accepted sessions fully confirmed by 30 April 2024.



Call for abstracts

The ISPH 2025 organising committee invites abstract submissions communicating research spanning all topics of palaeohistology. Histology research on extant taxa is invited but its implications for fossil research and palaeobiology/ecology must be made clear.

- Main text must not exceed 250 words.
- Title must not exceed 150 characters.
- Structure must follow scientific standards with the goal(s)/aims, methods, results, and implications/conclusions clearly presented.
- Please do not include tables, figures, and/or in-text citations/ references.
- Submissions are limited to two abstracts per lead author for the entire symposium. There is no limit to the number of times one author can be a co-author on other abstracts.

Abstract submission will be online via the <u>Sessions & abstracts</u> tab on our website. The submission platform opens at 9am AEST (GMT+10) on **1 May 2024** and closes at 5pm AEST on **1 April 2025**. Abstracts will be considered in batches and acceptances communicated on a rolling basis throughout the submission period.

Podium talks

- Talks are limited to 15 minutes (12 minutes talk + 3 minutes of questions).
- Presentation slides should be prepared in .ppt or .pptx format.
- Co-presented talks are welcome.

Further details on oral presentations will be shared in subsequent circulars.

Poster presentations

- Posters must not be larger than A0 size (33.1 inches x 46.8 inches/ 84.1 cm x 118.9 cm).
- Posters must be in portrait format.
- Please ensure a good balance between text and images.
